NI Veterans Commissioner's Office Update: A Year of Change and Commitment

As we step into the latter stages of 2024, the landscape for veterans across the UK is undergoing significant transformation. With changes in government and strategic realignments, the representation of veterans' issues and concerns is evolving, leading to a more streamlined approach to support and advocacy.

Resignation of Former Northern Ireland Veterans Commissioner Danny Kinahan

Earlier this month, Danny Kinahan stepped down from his role as Northern Ireland's first Veterans Commissioner. During his four years in office, Danny made substantial contributions to the veterans community, and we extend our heartfelt thanks for his dedication, engagement, and outreach efforts. The process for appointing his successor is already underway, and we hope to announce a new Veterans Commissioner soon. Updates regarding this appointment will be shared through the NI Veterans Commissioner's Office social media channels as more information becomes available.

Government Res<mark>tructuring</mark> and Its Implications

The recent change in government has resulted in the dissolution of the dedicated Minister for Veterans Affairs within the Cabinet Office. The Office for Veterans Affairs, previously established by the former administration, will now operate under the Ministry of Defence, led by Minister for Veterans & People, Alastair Carns MP. While this shift may change the representation of veterans at the government level, it is important to note that the Office for Veterans Affairs remains committed to delivering effective policies and strategies that recognise the invaluable contributions of our veterans to society.

In a significant development for Northern Ireland, a new Office for Veterans Affairs (Northern Ireland) post will be established in Belfast by early autumn. This position will be directly linked to the Office for Veterans Affairs in London, aiming to champion and integrate UK-wide policies for veterans residing in Northern Ireland. This initiative recognises the unique needs arising from our devolved administration and seeks to provide the best outcomes for NI veterans.

Support Services for Veterans

The Veterans Welfare Service for Northern Ireland continues to work closely with the Northern Ireland Veterans Commissioner's Team. Together, they ensure that veterans seeking advice, welfare, or assistance have access to local caseworkers who can provide tailored support. This partnership extends to collaborative efforts with service charities, ensuring that veterans in need are connected with the appropriate resources and support networks.

Upcoming Events

The Veterans Places, Pathways and People Programme is a significant funding initiative aimed at providing sustainable services and connections for veterans in Northern Ireland. A series of consultations are being held throughout the province, organised and facilitated by the Brooke House Health & Wellbeing Centre, with support from local Council Veterans Champions. The Northern Ireland Veterans Commissioner's Office is backing these events, and staff look forward to engaging with as many veterans as possible.

As we approach another period of remembrance, the NI Veterans Commissioner's Office will be actively involved in commemorative activities, providing support and representation for veterans. Additionally, the NIVCO-sponsored Op Banner Exhibition will be available for viewings, with further details to be announced soon. Veterans Places, Pathways & People Programme Consultations Begin

Veterans in Northern Ireland are set to benefit from a groundbreaking new phase of the Veterans, Places, Pathways, and People (VPPP) programme. Backed by the Veterans Mental Health and Wellbeing Fund, the VPPP programme is dedicated to creating lasting, sustainable support for veterans and their families as they build stronger futures.

The original VPPP programme, which ran from 2021 to 2023, focused on delivering direct support to veterans facing mental health challenges. The new phase, running from 2024 to 2027, will take that work even further, with a stronger emphasis on strategic development. This ensures the programme's impact will endure long after the funding period ends.

At its core, the VPPP programme aims to enhance veterans' physical and mental health through an evolving nationwide network of services. By promoting closer collaboration between military charities, health providers, and community organisations, the programme ensures veterans can access a seamless pathway of support. This includes not only access to essential health services but also opportunities to engage in therapeutic activities such as sporting, artistic, and horticultural endeavours, all of which foster personal connection and improve overall wellbeing.



For veterans and their families, the programme offers a welcoming space to find the support they need to thrive. Whether it's mental health services, community-building activities, or simply a place to connect, the VPPP programme opens doors and offers a helping hand.

But the benefits extend beyond individual veterans. Organisations involved in the programme will work together to build sustainable support networks that focus on long-term impact and community integration. This collaborative approach ensures that the programme's legacy will endure, creating a self-sustaining ecosystem of support for veterans and their families across Northern Ireland.

A gun salute from the 206 Battery Royal Artillery (Reserves) marked the occasion, while Explosive Ordnance Disposal robots and a variety of armoured vehicles, from tanks to transporters, were on display for all to see, touch and experience.

The event also highlighted the strong support from the Armed Forces community, with participation from both cadet and veteran organisations. Armed Forces Day aims to foster awareness and connection between the Armed Forces and the public, making it a free, familyfriendly event filled with interaction and celebration.

The exhibition officially opened at Brownlow House in May 2024 and is set to tour Northern Ireland, serving as an informative and educational tribute to the sacrifices made by military families and a homage to our shared history.

The exhibition features a series of informative panels that provide an overview of Operation Banner, alongside regimental and police uniforms, personal kit, and deactivated and replica weapons used by members of the Armed Forces and security personnel during this tumultuous period.

In his opening remarks, Veterans Commissioner Danny Kinahan emphasised the importance of remembering the contributions and sacrifices of service personnel. He stated:

"As part of my office's remit, I am keen not only to remember the great contribution, and indeed sacrifice, that many service personnel made during Operation Banner, but to also educate our community and bring to life the experiences of the men and women of the Ulster Defence Regiment, and others, including the members of the Royal Ulster Constabulary and Northern Ireland Prison Service."

NI Commemorates the 80th Anniversary of D-Day: A Tribute to Valour and Sacrifice

This year marks a significant milestone as we commemorate the 80th anniversary of D-Day, the operation that altered the course of World War II and paved the way for an Allied victory. As we reflect on this occasion, we recognise that the number of veterans from this historic event is dwindling, with many now reaching or surpassing their centenary years. Their bravery and sacrifice remain etched in our collective memory, reminding us of the high cost of freedom.

D-Day, which took place on June 6, 1944, was a monumental undertaking involving meticulous planning and coordination across land, air, and sea. Northern Ireland played a crucial role in this operation, serving as a vital staging ground for Allied forces. Many American troops were stationed in Belfast, Bangor, and surrounding areas, preparing for Operation Overlord the code name for the D-Day invasion. General Eisenhower himself visited Bangor to inspect his troops, highlighting the importance of this region and its people in the wartime effort.

Lough Erne and Enniskillen were instrumental in providing logistical support, aircraft and provision of reconnaissance and aerial assistance. These forces were essential for the success of the naval crossings from the United States and Canada to the United Kingdom, a perilous journey fraught with danger as German U-boats lay in wait to disrupt supply lines. The port of Londonderry also played a significant role as the first home port for many ships after their treacherous Atlantic crossing, with numerous World War II shipwrecks still lying off the coast of Donegal, serving as solemn reminders of the dangers faced during this time.

As we gather to remember, we reflect on the profound impact D-Day had on the world. It was a day when courage and determination triumphed over tyranny, allowing us to enjoy the freedoms we cherish today. For our present, they gave their tomorrow.

As we observe this 80th anniversary, let us honour the memory of those who served and ensure their stories are never forgotten. Their bravery is a testament to the resilience of the human spirit and a reminder of the importance of standing together in adversity. In the words of one veteran, "We did what we had to do, and we did it for those who would come after us." Let us carry that spirit forward as we continue to celebrate and protect the freedoms they fought so valiantly to secure.

Recently, the DMWS (Defence Medical Welfare Service) hosted a Veterans Health Seminar in Lisburn, which proved to be an inspiring event for all attendees. The seminar focused on the incredible support DMWS provides to veterans who are awaiting or undergoing medical treatment for both mental and physical health conditions. Notably, the event was attended by NI Health Minister Mike Nesbitt MLA, who emphasised that "consistency is key" in effectively addressing the health needs of veterans in the Northern Ireland.

The discussions highlighted the importance of collaboration within the veteran sector, emphasising how vital DMWS's role is in supporting the health and wellbeing of our veterans. The insights shared during the seminar underscored the commitment to ensuring that veterans receive the care and support they need during challenging times.

About DMWS Northern Ireland

DMWS offers independent and confidential welfare support for Armed Forces veterans and their families or carers in Northern Ireland. Their services include:

- A confidential and person-centred approach for veterans and their families.

- Emotional and practical support tailored to individual needs.

- Access to physical and mental health clinicians.

- Signposting and supported referrals to veteranfriendly agencies.

The service is built on considerable experience operating in Northern Ireland and is strengthened through collaboration with key partners. This ensures that DMWS operates with respect to and in line with the political and security context of the region. Key collaborations include:

- The NI Veterans Commissioner's Office

- The Veterans Welfare Service NI (VWS NI)

Ensuring Comprehensive Support for Veterans

DMWS is dedicated to ensuring that veterans receive the consultations they need with clinicians, providing support and guidance to manage both acute and chronic conditions. They link veterans to appropriate specialist services as they become available and advocate for their needs when required. The service also aims to provide an up-to-date, detailed account of the physical and/or mental health conditions veterans are experiencing, which reduces the need for them to repeatedly share their stories. For serious cases, DMWS ensures that available resources are accessed as quickly as possible and offers ongoing support to help maintain good self-management with complex clinical conditions. This approach allows veterans to "wait well" while awaiting onward referrals or treatment.



From Basra to Helmand: Honouring Our Iraq and Afghanistan Veterans

On Thursday, September 19, the Northern Ireland Veterans Commissioner's Office proudly welcomed over 100 veterans from the Iraq and Afghanistan campaigns to Parliament Buildings, Stormont. This special event was organised to foster networking, recognise service, and strengthen connections among those who have served in these significant military operations.

The day was marked by beautiful weather, which set the perfect backdrop for a memorable gathering. Attendees were treated to a captivating performance by the Frontier Pipes and Drums in the Great Hall, creating an uplifting atmosphere that resonated with pride and camaraderie. Following the performance, veterans embarked on a tour of the historic Stormont building, which highlighted its significant military history, particularly its role during World War II when the Senate Room served as an operations room for RAF Command.


